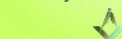

Organist Mike May reminds us “Where words leave off, music begins”.

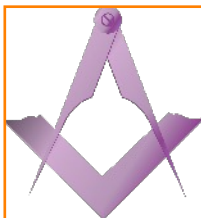


Provincial Organist Mike May is aware that many Lodges no longer have an organist to play music during a ceremony and have to rely on CDs.

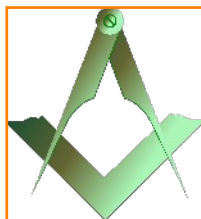

The Square and Compasses, do they need to be ‘plain and ordinary?’



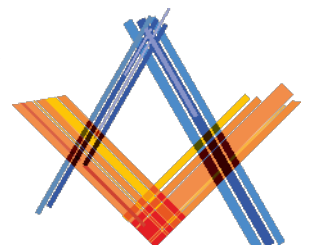
I suppose it depends on what is meant by the words ‘plain and ordinary’ after all it would be surprising if a Freemason ever considered these two important symbols to be anything other than quite extraordinary; after all they do comprise two thirds of the three great though emblematical lights in Freemasonry.



In terms of marketing and raising public awareness the symbols can often best be displayed using colour and these are four examples of a project we are working on at present in which we not only use single solid colours but also shades and tints. To the purist colour may be perceived as avant garde, but I wonder if Freemasons in days gone by said something similar when elaborately decorated gold and silver coloured symbols were used?

As one of the most recognised symbols of Freemasonry we must be careful never to devalue or debase the image, by the same token we must use it to maximise our visibility to a public audience.

One of the most visually powerful examples of a modern square and compasses has been used during the past year on the Provincial Display Stand and has proved to be a great conversation opener with visitors asking the team “what is that?” And that’s precisely the response we hoped for. In today’s society ‘image’ is important and we must present a vibrant, modern and positive image of our wonderful organisation.
