I look forward to joining them at their very special bi-centenary meeting on **Monday 21**st **May** at the Marriott Hotel in Swindon.

I am sure it will not have escaped your attention that during February an article appeared in the national press which erroneously alleged there were secret lodges with restricted membership situated in Westminster, The United Grand Lodge of England embarked on an extensive programme of rebuttal which included placing advertisements in a number of newspapers under the strap line 'Enough is Enough' - a sentiment which I am sure will find favour with many Wiltshire Freemasons. For far too long Freemasonry has been reluctant to challenge the absurd claims made about our membership, meetings and charity work. Our new Chief Executive decided 'Enough is Enough' and launched a concerted fight back which took him into radio and television studios from where he demolished the claims made against Freemasonry and took the opportunity to present a more honest and balanced view of the organisation. The campaign was given fresh momentum by the Pro Grand Master who used part of his address at Quarterly Communication meeting to reinforce the message and said "The time has come for the organisation to stand up and make these points loudly and clearly. Enough, brethren is enough." I am persuaded that we must be bold in our approach and handling of 'fake news' - the stereo typical comments about Freemasonry, albeit offered in a jocular fashion are wearing thin and detract from the good Freemasons do. To counter negative press reports and present the alternative of positive and objective news reporting, I have asked the Provincial Communication Officer to establish a programme by which we can prove to the world we 'Connect with the Community' and in this edition of the Newsletter you can read about Lodge of Good Fellowship No.8388 who supported two local 'community' based organisations. The Lodge invited the Assistant Provincial Grand Master Stephen Bridge and the Communication Officer to attend and we hope the local media will publish a short piece about these superb initiatives. The message is simple, let's tell our local communities about who we are and what we do - the unfounded caricature of Masons and untruths disguised as misunderstandings must no longer be acceptable 'Enough is Enough'

Just where do I put my thumb?

Little Jack Horner sat in the corner, eating his Christmas pie; he put in his thumb, and pulled out a plum, and said, "What a good boy am !! How easy it was for little Jack Horner, but where does a Freemason put his thumb? I refer of course to the confusion which ensues when the Lodge Chaplain intones a prayer and the question of the moment is 'is it thumb up or thumb down, and what is meant by thumb down'. Strangely, there is actually no



Masonic authorisation or explanation for a sign of reverence. However, such a sign, a closed hand placed over the seat of human emotion, the heart, is well recognised and respected outside Freemasonry across much of Western culture. We see it when an American President takes his Oath of Office, and when some nations sing their National Anthem, and it used to be a common sight at the roadside when a cortege passed by. The inclusion of this secular sign into a Lodge is as appropriate as standing to attention during the National Anthem (as we do at every meeting) they are not Masonic gestures, they are social ones.

So what do we mean by 'thumb down?' It simply means the thumb lies parallel with the fingers, which themselves are closed up and not splayed open. The Sign of Fidelity, a recognised Masonic sign, is explained in detail at the ceremony of Passing and should not be confused with a sign of reverence.

What about at the closing of the Lodge when the IPM calls us to unite in the act of F., F., F. Hearing the word 'Fidelity' some Lodge visitors and some Members unwittingly employ the Sign of Fidelity whereas the correct sign, in my opinion and based on a reading of the words of the rubric is a sign of reverence, not the Sign of Fidelity. The rubric or set of instructions or rules reads as follows - *He strikes his l.b. with his r.h. each time as he says these words, the Brethren doing likewise.* Sometimes we can and should be guided by what is **not** said or written, as opposed to looking for specific direction. This may just be such an occasion.
