Acts of random kindness.....



February is the month the Chinese celebrate their New Year - this year it's the year of the pig, and of course February 14th is St Valentine's Day. However did you know that Sunday 17th is 'Acts of random kindness day'. I must confess that I had some trouble understanding how you planned a 'random act of kindness' but I'm sure that someone will explain it to me. What I do know is that anything which promotes kindness in our society is to be encouraged and supported. Freemasons are urged "to be kind to one another" and I would hope this is a principle by which we would all live our lives. I am constantly in awe of the many acts of kindness which take place without fanfare and just

recently I heard about Ted Dredge the Master of Wiltshire Lodge of Fidelity No. 663 who is a blood donor with a difference. Ted is a regular visitor to the haematology department at the John Radcliffe Hospital in Oxford where he donates blood platelets, something he has been doing for the past two years. I understand he has donated well over the equivalent of 50 pints of blood. This 'act of kindness' would never have been known were it not for an observant Brother who commented on the magnificent veins standing out in his arms and hands. It transpires that Ted has a rare blood group and rather special blood; if he cuts himself the blood flow stops and the wound heals remarkably quickly. A phlebotomist's dream.

Over the Christmas period City Lodge No.5955 member Bro Jason Finlay and his family organised a collection for Salisbury's homeless and rough sleepers. This was the fifth year the family undertook this work and predates Bro Finlay's reception into Freemasonry. I believe this amply illustrates the meaning of the words in the charge to the Initiate, when referring to 'charity' we say "doubtless it has been felt and practised by you". Swindon Freemasons ably organised by Bro Peter Cowen, once again proved stalwart supporters of the local Women's Aid refuge by collecting all manner of essentials for the victims of domestic abuse. This was the eleventh year that Swindon Lodges including Highworth and Vastern Lodges have come together to make a real difference within the local community. Long may it continue!

What's up with WhatsApp?

Well actually nothing at all, a WhatsApp group can be a first class tool for enabling members to communicate with each other, and a number of Lodges have done just that with fantastic results. However, a recent enquiry has demonstrated just how quickly social media can morph from being a simple means of transmitting information into providing a medium for group debate and discussion. While at first glance you may think this is something to be absolutely positive about, unfortunately that's not always the case, particularly when the topics are not always related to Freemasonry and as such may not be enjoyed by everyone linked to the WhatsApp group. Straying off topic and using a WhatsApp group to debate political or social issues of the day is one way in which a system designed to be shared by many has become a platform for the expression and debate of personal views, as a result some members choose to leave the group rather than enter into the discussion and debate. It could be said that this negates the primary purpose of the WhatsApp group. If you have members who decline to join or leave your WhatsApp group, ask yourself - why?

Can I wear the Tercentenary Jewel?

As you might expect there are some 'rules' with regard to wearing the Tercentenary Jewel, starting with the fact it can only be worn by a Brother who has been a member between the 24 June 2016 and 31 December 2017. What may come as a surprise is that It can only be worn by Master Masons that is a Brother who has been Raised to the Third Degree. The Royal Arch Jewel (if a Companion) should be worn closest to the centre of the body and it is recommended that the Tercentenary Jewel be worn to its left, followed by the Provincial 2017 Festival Jewel and a Past Master's jewel However, both take precedence over a Founder's or any other Lodge specific jewel, which should, as a matter of 'good form' only be worn in the Lodge to which they apply.

Companions may wear the Tercentenary Jewel at a Wiltshire Chapter meeting but not at Supreme Grand Chapter. The golden rule is to always ask if you are unsure as Grand Superintendents from other Provinces may have different rules. A quick enquiry will provide guidance and avoid giving offence.

Ties can be a pain in the neck......

Just who would have thought that there is a Board of general purposes 'decision' on the wearing of the humble tie in a Craft Lodge, but strange as it may seem, yes there is. The starting point must always be a plain black tie or the Craft tie. An absolute don't do in Lodge is to wear a tie that is directly associated with an Order other than the Craft or Royal Arch. Wiltshire has its own Craft tie which can be worn in any Province where the PrGM of that Province has given his permission; this also applies to wearing the Wiltshire Royal Arch tie. The best advice is to never assume you can wear your favourite tie, best to check first. Club, society and even Lodge specific ties are not allowed, whereas in certain Lodges military or 'old school' ties are permitted.

Mentoring for young students in Swindon.....



The Provincial Grand Master Philip Bullock was joined by Provincial Charity Steward Derek Gibbens when visiting Lydiard Park Academy in Swindon to present a grant on behalf of the Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF) to the Villiers Park Educational Trust. The Grant was for £50,000 and is the largest single amount given in Wiltshire. The Freemason's £50,000 grant will pay for a Villiers Park Educational Trust learning mentor, as part of the social mobility charity's Scholars Programme.

The programme, which operates in seven schools and colleges in Swindon, has been shown to improve exam results, raise aspirations and motivation and increase vital skills such as confidence and communication.

We were particularly delighted the story was featured in a recent edition of the Swindon Advertiser.


