



Each of these initiatives demonstrates a desire on the part of the Province to promote Wiltshire Freemasonry, and while it is easy to visualise the difficulties in implementing them, I do believe the potential benefits should inspire us to make them work.

The Provincial church service at St Mary's, Calne was well attended by Brethren and Companions, as was the excellent carvery lunch prepared and served by Frances and Andrew Evans. Having attended the Provincial church service, Sally and I journeyed to Bradford on Avon to meet with the Brethren of Lodge of Friendship & Unity No.1271 and Broade Forde Lodge No.8547 who were celebrating 150 years of Freemasonry in the town, and attending evensong at Holy Trinity Church. It was lovely to see so many Freemasons in attendance.

A number of Brethren have expressed their concern that we no longer have any Provincial ties for sale. I am pleased to advise that Andrew Tiffin is 'on the case' and we expect to have a new tie available for sale in the early part of the new year.

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Reaping the reward



Best Practice -

In the absence of a clearly defined set of rules, the decision on 'what to do' in certain circumstances might seem a little daunting. Relying on a whim and prayer may suffice for a time, but not for ever. Quite frequently we revert to the tried and tested, or to put it another way 'custom and practice'. And if we are ever unsure as to how we should do something there will always be someone waiting in the wings to offer some 'words of advice'.



The Lodge Summons is a case in point. Many secretaries, especially those of longstanding, know how to compile a Summons having regard to the rules contained in the 321 pages of the Book of Constitutions. The Summons is a fairly easy document to prepare, but as is often said - 'the devil is in the detail'.

An application for membership has four very clear stages, one informal and three formal, of which the latter two have a great deal of similarity. The informal stage is the introduction and 'no commitment' getting to know each other meeting; the first of the more formal stages is the interview (Pathway to the fore) and the final two stages are the Proposal and the Ballot. You will note that there is no 'Notice of Motion' as such a stage is neither mandated for, nor is it considered necessary by both UGLE and the Province.

Assuming all goes well with stages one and two, the Lodge secretary will be asked to put into effect stages three and four. Stage four is covered by Rule 164(b) in the Book of Constitutions, and requires the publication of seven pieces of information (thankfully they are all contained in the Form P) - but what about stage three, the Proposal in open Lodge? You might be surprised to discover that the BoC is silent on what information should be on he Summons, in fact Rule 159 doesn't mention the need for any detail and Rule 163(b) refers only to the information required by the secretary from a candidate being submitted on the correct Form P.

Which brings us to 'Best Practice' as employed in the Province of Wiltshire for almost twenty years. In order to clarify and regularise the process of Proposing new Freemasons, it was determined that the self same detail used to inform Brethren of the ballot should **also** be used to advise them of the proposal.
