What does the future hold for Freemasonry?



s the Government announces the need for a further period of social restrictions I hope this mid-month edition of the Provincial Newsletter finds you all well and keeping your spirits up by way of doing all those jobs around the home that built up over the winter months.

First, I'm sure you will have noticed that the newsletter has a 'new look' and It's not the fact that I'm writing the front page item. Rather I am referring to the new title In touch > On line which more accurately describes what the newsletter does and how it does it; by helping to keep everyone In touch, and doing so On line. I do hope you like the new format.

I would like to reiterate the sentiments of UGLE by saying that in today's uncertain times, Freemasonry provides an anchor of stability for our members. The Masonic principles of integrity, charity and respect for others are as valid during these times as they have ever been. Notably the immense contribution made by Freemasons of all backgrounds within their communities is a great tribute to the value of this organisation in the modern world.

On behalf of the Provincial Grand Master I would like to thank all those Wiltshire Freemasons who have given of their time and resources, not only now but in the time leading up to this crisis. It is your dedicated support in contacting the older brethren, delivering groceries, enthusing our new made brothers with Lodge quizzes, having virtual get togethers and all the other initiatives that enables Freemasonry to continue as a vibrant, credible and useful part of society. This makes me immensely proud to be a Freemason and to be your Deputy Provincial Grand Master.

The Prime Minister has announced that restrictions on movement and social distancing will continue for the next six weeks. With little, if any real easing of the situation, I believe we must now accept that the provisos attached to the five conditions to be met before full interaction with each other is possible, makes it very unlikely that we will meet together for some time. In truth many of our members may only feel able to return when there is a vaccination against the Covid-19 virus, and even then social distancing may well continue until the vast majority of the population is protected and numbers of new cases have fallen to an extremely low and acceptable level. With regards to Freemasonry, the concept of 40/50 men meeting in closed rooms and then sitting shoulder to shoulder at a dinner is not, in my opinion a conceivable notion until it is declared safe to do so, and even then I suspect some restrictions will apply for a period of time yet to be decided.

The Provincial Executive is acutely aware that the present situation in which there are so many unknowns, and an equal number of unanswered questions, leaves us all in a quandary as to what we will do and more importantly whether we will ever return to how we were. We now await further advice from UGLE which will be shared with you through your Lodge secretary and bUGLE.

My message to you is simply this. Thank you for your dedicated support and continued patience. Thank you for the marvellous work you are doing making sure that all our Lodge members are being looked after and kept as safe as possible. Thank you to everyone who has followed the guidance from the Government and the scientific community to restrict making unnecessary journeys, and to close by reminding you of the new message - **Stay Alert, Control The Virus, Save Lives.**

Corsham extends its food chain....

The secretary of Corsham Lodge No.6616 John Deane, reports on the success of the food box delivery service for Freemasons and Masonic widows who, for various reasons are unable to shop for themselves. Following the instruction from HM Government that certain categories of people must self isolate for 12 weeks, and others are restricted in their movements, Freemasons from Corsham put in



place a scheme to deliver Food Boxes to the most vulnerable in the local area.

Working with Totally Food which is owned and managed by Tom Snell (one time private chef to the Saudi Royal Family and chef at Michelin starred 'The Hare restaurant') the Corsham Lodge members, under the direction of local resident and secretary John Deane, have created a fresh food package which is then distributed to addresses in Corsham, Chippenham, Melksham, Bath, Devizes and Swindon. 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Stop Press....

Wiltshire Freemasons through the Masonic Charitable Foundation have made a Grant of £10,000 to St Joseph's School in Salisbury. The Grant will enable the school to produce 20,000 full face visors which will be distributed to local care homes, ambulance stations, GP surgeries and anywhere an emergency services worker requires Personal Protective Equipment. The MCF has set aside over £1 million for Covid-19 related support with £100,000 being allocated to RCG9.

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Forget-Me-Not Masonic Horse Brass....

We can can always depend on Jim Speed a member of Fiat Lux lodge No. 9773 to come up with a great idea, and his latest one is an absolute cracker. During a lull in his day (there's not many of those, it has to be said), Jim was looking at the antique Masonic swinger horse brass on the wall at his home while at the same listening to the build up to the VE Day celebrations on the television. The thought occurred to him that Freemasonry is in a similar state today as it was in the war years when the forget-me-not flower became the remembrance symbol of the Craft.

From that initial thought Jim set out a scheme where the forget-me-not could be aligned with the square and compasses to form a uniquely different Masonic horse brass, and provide a poignant reminder of how Freemasonry survived Covid-19.

From the sale of the first Masonic horse brass, members of Fiat Lux Lodge were able to raise £500 for Teddies for Loving Care - Wiltshire Jim's hope is that this latest initiative will raise even more for the MCF Covid-19 Appeal.

The picture on the left shows Jim's horse brass with a tiny forget-me-not flower in the centre of the Square and Compasses. From this idea the drawing on the right was produced. This shows the square and compasses have been drawn larger without the inner ring, so that the flower petals of the forget-me-not will look more impressive.

The height of the brass would be 4" and the width 2 ½" and the retail price £22 plus packing and UK postage £3.50. It will also be possible to offer a wholesale price for 5 brasses or more. Priority could be given to the production of these brasses when the foundry return to work following the lock-down. Consideration is being given to provide a base for the swinger brass so that it could be displayed on the mantlepiece.
