The first thing I want to say is how good it was to receive a special letter from the Pro Grand Master Peter Lowndes in which he emphasised the importance of Freemasonry's voluntary contribution to society, and our colossal involvement in all aspects of charity. He outlined

just a few of the many incredible social initiatives in which Freemasons have been involved, including the manufacture of PPE, provision of meals, home visits and endless other things. Like the Pro Grand Master, I have an enormous sense of pride in what is being done especially by Brethren in Wiltshire; and I echo his words when he wrote, "What comes over loud and clear is that our Brethren are doing all this work because they **WANT** to do it." I'm sure you all knew that the first week of June is Volunteers Week, I'm pleased to acknowledge that Wiltshire Freemasons can be found volunteering their time and talents every week of the year. Today I'm saying "Thank you for all you do".

As part of my role in the Province I have oversight of the work of the Grand Superintendent of Works; the Provincial Mentor and the Sarsen Club. I am particularly pleased to report that Sandy Steele-Davis has been working with Masonic Hall committees to ensure the safety and security of their buildings during the 'lockdown'. While operating on a normal cycle of activity the issue of water purity is of little consequence, when a facility is unused 'normal rules' don't always apply, and I know that water suppliers have been anxious to ensure all necessary precautionary measures have been followed. In addition Sandy has advised committees on what financial assistance they may be entitled to under various Government Coronavirus assistance programmes.

The Provincial Mentor David Little has been exceptionally busy working with the recently announced and newly appointed Divisional Mentors. I know that all the Lodge Mentors have been contacted by their respective Divisional Mentor; for the sake of good order I am pleased to confirm that Foster Telford (South), Richard Wright (Central) and Alan Colman (North) have been appointed by the PrGM. Under normal circumstances they would have been introduced to you at Provincial Grand Lodge in October, however, given the current circumstances they have started work straight away.

The Sarsen Club joined Brethren from New and Young Masons Clubs (NYMC) in a number of Virtual Inter-Club Social events. Their guest speakers so far have included Christine Chapman from the HFAF, Dr David Staples CEO of UGLE and Thomas Wood, RW Grand Master of the Province of Kilwinning. The club also had a presentation from John Reid and Mark Fuller on the Holy Royal Arch; and Andy Beaumont and Steve Lee who outlined the close links between Mark Master Masons and the Craft.

On behalf of the Provincial Grand Master I would like to say a huge thank you to everyone who has followed the guidance from the Government and the scientific community to practise social distancing, restrict making unnecessary journeys, and to close my first piece in In touch > On line by reminding you of the new message from the Government - Stay Alert, Control The Virus, Save Lives. They had a fairly full calendar of working guide dog bookings through this year until the lockdown took effect. The Guide Dog Association (GDA) has also had to go into lockdown as far as it can. They asked if anyone was prepared to provide 24/7 emergency response i.e. collect a dog and look after it if the owner was ill. Colin and Hilary volunteered for the extra duty, and at the end of April, the GDA called to ask them take Nico, an 8 month old guide dog puppy who was having some difficulties. He has proved to be a handful as his social skills were poor. Being in lockdown this might have seemed to be an ideal opportunity for getting out and walking twice a day. It was not to be as Nico had his own GDA imposed lockdown and was not allowed outside the front door while his issues were being resolved. There followed regular Skype calls with the GD experts and, fortunately, some good progress in sorting the dog's issues. In theory the puppy should go into final training at about 12



months but there is currently a training backlog so he will be 16-18 months before starting full time training. In the meantime, the regular GD owners have been keeping in touch as they are looking to go on holiday when it is safe to do so.
