Like many of you I was saddened to hear of the passing of Dame Vera Lynn

known to so many as the 'Forces sweetheart.' Dame Vera was a national treasure and her name will forever be associated with such songs as 'A Nightingale Sang in Berkeley Square' and 'There'll Always Be an England'. But undoubtedly, her most popular song was 'We'll meet again', and it was a line from the lyrics of this song which HM The Queen quoted in her latest address to the nation. I was thinking of these words when I heard of the sad passing of Bro Steve Wragg (St Edmund Lodge No.4714). Steve, was not only a fine man and Freemason, he was also 'mine host' at the Green

Dragon in Market Lavington, often referred to as the Provincial office. While not a factor in Steve's death, It is a sad fact that Covid 19 has had a significant affect on Freemasons; hardly surprising you might think given that many members are in what are colloquially referred to as 'vulnerable groups'. In a recent edition of First Rising, the newsletter of UGLE, the Deputy Grand Master points out that nearly 200 Brethren have succumbed to this awful virus. I want to assure you that upon our return to normal Masonic activities, we will remember every Brother who has passed to the Grand Lodge Above during the dark days of this pandemic.

I am delighted to hear from Brethren who continue to ask the question - "When will we start Masonic meetings?" This is often coupled with an enquiry as to what changes, if any, will be required in our ceremonies in order to comply with physical distancing guidelines; to which the answer to both questions is the same, we just don't know, moreover, it achieves nothing to speculate what may or may not happen. What I can assure you of is that UGLE is on the case, and a special group is working on proposals to make sure that when we do return to labour, everyone is safe and that our working practises do not put anyone at undue risk.

For many of our members Covid-19 has negatively impacted their finances. Some have been furloughed (a word I never expected to be used in respect of employment) and a few have lost their jobs, and their income. Freemasons are not immune to the economic effects of 'lockdown' and it is for this reason that In the recent edition of First Rising, The MW Grand Master announced that there will not be any increase in Grand Lodge dues, or subscriptions to the MCF for 2021. I am pleased to confirm that similarly there will be no increase in Provincial Grand Lodge subscriptions for the same period. I would also take this opportunity to point out that should any Brother find himself in distress, the Masonic Charitable Foundation may be able to offer assistance, and that your Lodge Almoner should contact the Provincial Almoner Gary Dolphin for further information.

Methuen Lodge No.8692 will be hosting the Prestonian Lecture 2020 on Sunday 12th July at 7.00pm. Thanks to the wonder of Zoom, access to the lecture is made very easy, travelling across the Province is not necessary and the timing should not interfere with any other social activities. This is the only Wiltshire presentation of the Prestonian Lecture and I would urge you to please make the effort to support Methuen Lodge and the Prestonian Lecturer W, Bro Boys-Stones.

Talking about lectures and Zoom meetings, recently members of The Sarsen Club were treated to an introduction to the Order of Knights Templar given by Provincial Prior, Richard Micklefield.


Prestonian Lecture via Zoom....

Provincial Church Service....

The Provincial Communication Officer for the Holy Royal Arch, Mark Fuller has confirmed that this years' annual church service, scheduled for October has become yet another victim of the Covid-19 crisis. The Most Excellent Grand Superintendent, John Reid, and The Provincial Grand Master, Philip Bullock having considered the essential precautionary measures necessary to ensure the safety and well being of Companions, and Brethren and their families, have concluded that it would be impractical to hold a service.
