Freemasons remember the fallen

November 2020 Here we go again....



It was an American DJ 'Marshmello' who penned a song with almost no words other than the line 'Here we go again' - and Brethren while it is not a recording I would recommend that you listened to, t does give me the opportunity to write about the further suspension of Masonic activity which came into effect on Thursday 5th November. The decision was not unexpected given that the Government had announced a second lockdown which will remain in place until Wednesday 2nd December; and as we enter this period it is important that we remain positive.

However, Lockdown doesn't mean shutdown. The suspension doesn't mean we can't practise what it means to be a Freemason, in fact we are reminded that we should always practise out of the Lodge those excellent precepts we are taught within. Living Freemasonry is not just about attending meetings, it is as much about what we do, as what we call ourselves. Indeed Freemasonry is more about what we do in our communities as opposed to our Masonic meetings.

Brethren I know that many of our Lodges have made arrangements to maintain contact with members during the past few months. I have been pleased to hear about the many initiatives set up by Lodges and to commend the practise of them to every Lodge. I wish to emphasise four very specific actions you can take to make a difference.

Make a weekly phone call to a Brother or Lodge widow - even if you've tried before, try again. Write a fun quiz or fun talk and deliver it to your lodge on Zoom, it's a great way to socialise. Take the time to learn about the Royal Arch from your Royal Arch Representative, and explore SOLOMON the online learning tool, and make a daily advancement in Masonic knowledge. Finally, if you use Social Media please like and share the Province's Facebook posts, and retweet our Twitter comments.

November is the precursor of winter and another period of lockdown at this time isn't good for our mental health. For some of our Brethren, these dark days may just be the trigger which sparks a bout of anxiety and depression. If you are a Brother suffering as a result of Covid-19 or the loneliness of 'lockdown' or you know of a Brother who is experiencing difficulties- there is help available from the Masonic Charitable Foundation supported counselling helpline. This pandemic is affecting us all in different ways and if you need help, do not be too proud to ask for it. The Provincial Almoner will engage with the MCF on your behalf, and subject to fulfilling their criteria you may be eligible to receive help. However, it is important to point out that most MCF staff are working from home, and that a number of medical treatment options are not currently being considered at the present time. There is little to be gained from 'thumping the table' or 'making demands' - the MCF teams are working with the Provincial Almoner to bring more services online, but we have to accept that, just as the NHS is struggling to cope with elective surgery, so to is the MCF.

Finally, Brethren I am delighted to announce three important promotions in the Province (see p4 for more detail). Members of the Provincial Executive play a key role in the management of the Province and I am confident the appointment of Simon Leighfield, Phil Still and Rob Evans in their respective offices will provide the expertise and energy required to take Wiltshire forward into new and exciting times. I wish you well and ask you to keep safe and keep well.



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November 2020 Growing our membership is vital....

It's no secret that the long term future of any membership dependent organisation is reliant upon a steady stream of new people joining its ranks. Freemasonry is a membership organisation. Sadly some of our members pass away as a result of illness or advancing years and we are reminded that "The wisest among us knows not how soon." Some of our members move away in a geographical sense while

others have grown apart in an emotional sense having perhaps become disenchanted with Freemasonry; and a very small number leave our ranks due

to economic and social reasons. Every loss is hard to bear and has an affect not only on the Lodge but also the Province and the wider family of Freemasonry. We need to not only stem the flow, but also take action to grow our total membership. Neither task is easy but if we don't address them of one thing we can certainly be sure, and that is we won't have an organisation on which to build and what remains will become less attractive to join and wither and die away.

In recent years the Province of Wiltshire has bucked the national trend with record numbers of men enquiring about Freemasonry which has resulted in many of our Lodges conducting double (or more) Initiation ceremonies in order to welcome new members. Covid-19 has put an unwelcome brake on matters but I am glad to note that despite only being able to operate with the 'rule of six' Lodges are slowly but surely coming to terms with the UGLE adaptations and putting into place plans to conduct future Initiations. We have 94 candidates allocated to Lodges waiting to be initiated (of which 31 have not yet completed Form Ps with a large number having not yet been interviewed) and 9 waiting to be allocated to a Lodge by the Divisonal Officer, and a further 10 who have made membership enquiries in the last few weeks. It would be good if all the Form Ps could be completed and interviews could be carried out as soon as practicable as we could then more accurately assess the true number of potential initiates.

Part of my role as Divisional Officer Co-ordinator has been to review the way in which the Province manages membership and in particular new and prospective members.

I am sure you will agree that keeping in touch with potential members during these particularly difficult days is very important, and that every effort should be made to maintain close contact and engage in regular communication with every person who has expressed an interest in becoming a Wiltshire Freemason. It is vitally important that we do everything we can to enhance the experience of the applicant, and to make them feel even more 'wanted'.

What I am very aware of is that Covid-19 has created a barrier to meeting new members and the rule of six is not conducive to making a new Brother feel 'at home' in a truncated meeting format. Consequently I am planning to hold a series of open ZOOM meetings for potential and possible candidates (who have completed their Form P) and their partners to meet and **ASK ME ANYTHING.** This forum will enable not only the potential candidate but also his partner to ask any questions they might have, and to receive answers to their questions.

I would like to take this opportunity to say thank you to every secretary who has provided the essential detail which has enabled me to contact and invite potential and possible candidates to attend an **ASK ME ANYTHING** meeting.



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The rule of six proves no obstacle to an Initiation....

The Lodge is now looking forward to undertaking two Passing ceremonies.

The excellent Pathway Programme, introduced by UGLE and supported by the Province, provide the necessary safeguards to make sure that enquirers to Freemasonry are interviewed and properly questioned before a decision is made as to their suitability for membership. Please be patient, asks Gary Dolphin....

The Covid - 19 virus has affected just about every aspect of our lives, with family life being disrupted, working life made difficult, and access to the NHS services, particularly for elective treatments, all but impossible. In April 2020 the NHS 'bought up' almost every private hospital bed in the country on a 'just in case' basis. We now know they didn't use them all, but the unintended consequence was that surgeons who would have used the facilities were unable to do so. The net result of the closure of the NHS to non-covid sufferers is a waiting list for treatment which some 'experts' predict will take many months, even years to reduce to precovid levels.



What may come as a surprise to many members is that the MCF Grants and Enquiries Team have continued to work from home to provide support, and process claims during the periods of lockdown. Unfortunately, a result of the limited availability of clinical beds has been a restriction on the number of categories of medical and social support for which the MCF has been able to accept applications. However, I am able to report that the MCF is constantly reviewing the situation and is hoping to open up some of the restricted categories as soon as circumstances allow them to.

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Supporting Fiat Lux Lodge No.9773 and the M.C.F.

In the old days this attractively designed horse brass would have been attached to the top of the bridle of a heavy horse. It is being produced now as a most desirable reminder of the absence of our beloved Masonic meetings due to the coronavirus pandemic.

The humble forget-me-not has been an emblem of Freemasonry for many years and stems from the legend surrounding German Freemasonry during WW2.

In recent years the subject has been researched and as much as we would like to believe that the little forget-me-not lapel pin was worn as a point of recognition during the dark years of the war no evidence of this has ever been found.



The most poignant final paragraph of one research paper concludes:- The history of the forget-me-not, is laden with legend and symbolism. And quibbling over historic accuracy merely clouds the true intent of the story. Legends like these are not told to teach us historical fact; they are meant to teach us enduring truth, or even truths, plural. And the truths of the forget-me-not are these; We must never forget our duty to the poor and distressed. We must never forget to persevere through troubled times, as light and life will always spring anew. We must never forget those who have come before us; the sacrifices they made, and the love that they shared with us. We must never forget our duty to honour their memory, and continue their legacy of brotherly love, relief, and truth. Amor fraternus, levatio, veritas. Forget. Me. Not."
