I guess everyone has a favourite Christmas song or carol and I'm sure you will recognise the phrase 'It's Christmas time' as the first line of the Band Aid single Do they know it's Christmas. As I started to write this piece for the December edition of In touch>On line I found myself thinking of the opening verse to the song which was sung by Paul Young, and had such an impact when it was released in 1984. It's Christmas time, there's no need to be afraid. At Christmas time, we let in light and we banish shade. It seemed to me that after the doom and gloom

of the past eleven months it is only right and proper that we should allow ourselves a moment to reflect on the true message of the Christian gospel as we now look forward to in the celebration of Christmas and the birth of Christ, who gave light and hope to a suffering world.

The new special rules allowing even greater mobility between 23<sup>rd</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> December will allow families to join each other and enjoy a near traditional Christmas.

Few would argue with me when I say that the coronavirus has had a significant effect on all our lives; this invisible but insidious enemy has negatively impacted on many of the things we hold dear and has severely affected our ability to enjoy what we regard as our normal way of life.

### Local Lodges support Swindon Domestic Abuse Support Service....

For the **thirteenth** year running local Freemasons are supporting the Swindon Domestic Abuse Support Service (SDASS) Christmas Appeal. However, due to Covid-19 this year's appeal will be very different. In previous years, members and their families came along to the Swindon Masonic Centre in early December to generously donate various items to bring a little seasonal joy to victims of domestic violence and abuse, and their children.

Unfortunately, due to Covid-19 restrictions the Lodges cannot use the facilities at the Swindon Masonic Centre for this purpose. Nevertheless, they are still going to support SDASS with their endeavours to provide as good a Christmas as possible for an estimated **22** women and **40** children who will be residing at the refuge this Christmas, and up to **80** women and their children in the community

This year has been a difficult one for everyone due to the Covid-19 Pandemic and incidents of domestic abuse have increased considerably, particularly so during the first lockdown.

The appeal this year is for cash (monetary) donations to Swindon Women's Aid. A donation for any amount will be extremely welcome either by cheque posted to Swindon Women's Aid or by an online transaction to Swindon Women's Aid bank account. Payment details are as follows;

### Mentoring Matters....

While it may be easy to criticise the man who joins our fraternity 'from off the internet' there is no evidence whatsoever to support the myth that he is less interested or committed to Freemasonry; on the contrary there is ample proof that they are keen participants in Lodge activities. David Little and his team of Divisional Mentors will be working with Lodge Mentors to introduce new ways of connecting with young Freemasons, offering help to support Brethren who are unsure of what they want to do in and for the Lodge, and to assist in retrieving those Brethren who are not attending the Lodge. As has been made clear before, this work is not intended to supplant the role of the Lodge, rather it is to enhance the overall experience that every member has the right to enjoy, including the over arching role of the Province in all Masonic matters.
