## Dougie Covill celebrates 100....

Bro Dougie Covill, a founder member of Forget Me Not Lodge No.9035, celebrated his 100<sup>th</sup> birthday on 14<sup>th</sup> November 2020. He was presented with a framed photograph of the Founder Members who attended the consecration of the Lodge in May 1982, and a specially produced birthday card from the Master, Wardens, and Brethren of the Lodge. He also received a Provincial Grand Master's Certificate of Achievement for having served 65 years in Freemasonry.

Dougie Covill joined the 10th Hussars at Tidworth in April 1937, shortly after the regiment returned from India. He was deployed to Normandy in 1940 and took part in the Battle of Huppy. As a troop sergeant he fought in North Africa and Italy (1941-45). Dougie was twice wounded, Mentioned in Dispatches in January 1944, he was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal in April 1945, and received the MBE in the New Year's Honours list of January 1969.

Dougie remained with the Regiment after the war, was commissioned and retired in 1970. Having settled in Alresford he was involved in many organisations and was Mayor of Winchester in 1988. Dougie married Inge in 1947. They had two daughters, Geraldine and Angela, three grandsons and two great grandchildren.

Many congratulations Dougie from the Brethren of the Lodge and the Province of Wiltshire.

A Lodge website which does not have a Provincial Charter Mark cannot use any material, including logos which identify the site with either the province or UGLE and must request permission to use any images which are the intellectual property of the Province or UGLE. Wiltshire's Provincial website has been awarded the prestigious UGLE Charter Mark which is formal recognition that the site meets the exacting standards required by the UGLE digital team.

## A year spent visiting by Paul Robinson....

At my installation in March 2019, the Presiding Officer Bro David Davies suggested that if I was able to, I should visit a few Lodges and carry the good name of Lodge of Fidelity No.663 around the Province. Never being one to shirk a challenge I studied the meetings calendar from the Provincial website and quickly realised that I could actually do a lot more than just a few. In fact, I set myself a target to visit every Craft Lodge in the Province in a period of twelve months. Some



meticulous 'military' planning then took place as I aligned the meeting dates against my work roster, which rather fortunately showed that the vast majority of meetings occurred on designated rest days.

Having attended my own installation and that at Fiat Lux Lodge No.9773, my first away visit took place on 4th April 2019 when I attended Clarendon Lodge No.5908 which meets at Trowbridge. Thereafter my visiting schedule covered fifteen visits through April, May and June; and in August and September I made two visits each month.

October was a busy month with fourteen visits; one of which was to Provincial Grand Lodge held at Salisbury. To make so many visits required some logistics planning, not least as I found myself having to attend two Lodges on the same day; Fiat Lux No.9773 in the morning and Vastern Lodge No.8977 in the evening. October also saw eight visits in fourteen days including four on consecutive days. November saw an additional six visits and December one.

The New Year saw two further visits in January, before my last visit to Salisbury in February for the meeting of Stonehenge Lodge No.6114 when I was presented with a specially engraved firing glass by the Brethren of the Lodge. This is a much treasured and very special memento which takes pride of place at home in Devizes.

There were also three visits to Lodges which held their meetings outside of the Province. Henley (Oxfordshire), Round Table Lodge; Havant (Hampshire and Isle of Wight), Master Builders Lodge, and St Columbanus (Gloucestershire) which met at Calne.

The highlight of the year was my first visit to Freemasons' Hall in Great Queen Street for the December Quarterly Communications Meeting. It would not be overstating matters to say the 'Big House' was extremely impressive, as was lunch at Mark Masons Hall in St James.

In Province I attended all 45 Lodges, travelled 1631 miles, witnessed; 17 initiations (2 doubles - 1 being a double Lewis); 9 Passings (4 doubles); 7 Raisings (1 double);10 Installations of which two were long workings; 2 lectures and Provincial Grand Lodge.

One of the lessons I learned in my visits was that every Lodge offered something special which made each unique. Four Lodges operate in shared buildings and actually have to set up the Lodge Room, and pack it up after the meeting. Now that is a labour of love. Every Lodge received me with warmth and friendliness and I was made to feel very welcome and treated as one of their own on each occasion. I have made so many new friends. Wiltshire Lodges really are the epitome of Freemasonry.

To those wondering - yes, I was still able to wear the same suit throughout my visits, and yes,I'm still married. Kathy was happy to have the TV remote control all to herself.

P.S. Contrary to the calumnies perpetuated elsewhere, I didn't win all the raffles.....
