Is this our new beginning?

This time last year I wrote that "January is the month of new beginnings, the time of year most of us stop and take stock of our lives, look back on the past twelve months, re-evaluate our priorities and set ourselves new goals." I went on to say "I'm equally sure you will appreciate that sometimes the best laid plans of mice and men often go awry; a saying adapted from a line in "To a Mouse," by the Scottish poet Robert Burns. Little did I know that a virus, unknown to us at the time of writing would change 2020 into an annus horribilis, not only for Freemasons but for people throughout the world. Covid-19 entered the lexicon of

the medical fraternity and 'lockdown' became the word of the year, joining coronavirus, social distancing, self-isolate and furlough in the top ten words of the English language. Christmas, normally a time when families and friends gather together to have a good time was distinctly muted, and traditional New Year celebrations have also been placed 'on hold'. Normal life, defined as being what we had before Covid, appears to a be a little way off, as does the prospect of an immediate return to large Masonic meetings. The situation has been made a little more difficult by the Government's latest decision to revisit the Tier structure, and the news that Swindon has been moved to Tier 3 while the rest of Wiltshire remains in Tier 2. Who knows whether we will all be placed in Tier 4?

And yet I am persuaded that what defines us most as men and as Freemasons is how we respond in times such as these. I remind myself of the words written by Jobie Hughes - *"When you have lost hope, you have lost everything. And when you think all is lost, when all is dire and bleak, there is always hope."* Hope consists of a desire for an outcome and a belief in that outcome's possibility and is often said to be synonymous with optimism. For Freemasons the news that scientists have produced a vaccine for Covid-19 has raised the expectation that we will soon be able to meet in our beautiful Masonic Lodge Rooms and to once again engage in the performing of our ceremonies.

I am confident that Wiltshire Freemasons will emerge from the dark months of 2020 and experience a true renaissance, a rebirth that will lead to a new and vibrant period of revival and of renewed interest in what Freemasonry is, and what it offers to the man seeking to improve himself.

I am grateful to those Lodges which have advised the Provincial Secretary of their intention to work throughout the summer (Covid-19 rules permitting) and to initiate candidates who have been patiently waiting to be admitted to the Craft. I know that Colin Cheshire has maintained contact with many of the men who have registered an interest in becoming Freemasons, and I am looking forward to meeting them in the very near future. I am also encouraged by the news that even during 'lockdown' expressions of interest continue to be received by the Provincial membership team.

There is no doubt that many of our members will have experienced a profound sense of loneliness, having been prevented from spending Christmas with either friends or their loved ones. Provincial Almoner says mental ill health is not imaginary....

I am very aware that we have just experienced a very different Christmas to the ones we are used to enjoying. For the younger members of society, often referred to as the post war generation, the notion that Christmas could ever be spent alone is a contradiction to everything they believe about the festive season, whereas for some of our more senior members the memory, distant though it might be, of a Christmas spent separated from loved ones is very real.

However being alone is not necessarily the same as being lonely, and it is the reality of loneliness together with its consequences that we must recognise if

we are to have any chance of addressing the needs of those most affected. The impact of 'lockdown' or should that be multiple 'lockdowns' should not be underestimated as clinicians examine the part that lockdowns are playing in the mental health of the nation. Evidence suggests that they are having a detrimental effect, not only on those with pre-existing mental health issues, but also those with no previous history of mental ill health.

Humans are naturally social, Freemasons especially so. In recognising this fact it must surely be accepted that physical distancing, imposed isolation or self shielding are intrinsically alien to our normal way of life. And yet for the past twelve months this strange way of living our lives has become the 'new normal'. it looks likely to continue for a few more months as we are told the holy grail of a vaccine will be subject to a national programme of immense logistical complexity . It will probably be the end of 2021 before enough of the population is protected from Covid-19, and we are permitted to return to a more normal way of life.

The awareness of the new phenomena of 'Long Covid' (not a medical definition, but rather a word created on Twitter) will undoubtedly feature on the 'list of things to study' for a future generation of psychiatrists and psychologists anxious to acquire greater knowledge and understanding of the lasting impact of lockdown restrictions on mental health.

One of the wonderful things about Freemasonry is the way in which we do not rush to make negative judgements on a Brother's mental ill health, but rather we take a more nuanced view in which we consider the many ways in which we as individuals can help, and equally importantly how we can signpost a Brother to the excellent counselling service provided through the Masonic Charitable Foundation's partnership with an independent team of professional counsellors and therapists who are registered and accredited by the UK Council for Psychotherapy.

The counselling service offers mental health support to Freemasons and their family members who are experiencing low mood, symptoms of depression, anxiety, stress or other conditions affecting their mental wellbeing. While a financial assessment is not required to access the standard counselling service, a full financial assessment is required to access other specialist mental health support. However, please do not put off asking for help from a fear that you may be ineligible, a phone call will almost certainly be able to provide an answer to your enquiry.

If you have experienced Covid-19 or know someone who has, and you would like to access counselling either for yourself or a friend, the enquiries team is available to provide 'confidential' mental health support.
