If there is one thing that the recent series of MEET THE OFFICER Zoom events has revealed to me, it is that we have quite a few Yorkshire men in Wiltshire Freemasonry. So in this edition of In touch>On line I am very pleased to wish all our white rose supporters, a Happy Yorkshire Day.

Following the recent announcement from the Prime Minister, Masonic meetings across the Province have resumed with hardly any restrictions whatsoever. I know I speak for the Provincial Team when I say how much we are looking forward to supporting our Lodges at their Installation Meeting. From a personal perspective I am also hoping to be able to attend a number of the planned Initiation meetings, particularly those involving the gentlemen who have been supporting the MEET THE OFFICER series of Zoom meetings.

Some Brethren have queried the situation with regard to the wearing of masks or face coverings in meetings, as there appear to be mixed messages 'flying' around. The law is quite clear in that it is not mandatory for anyone to wear a face covering other than in certain places, and in enclosed spaces, where it is difficult to maintain social distancing. The message from the UGLE is that we must comply with all legal requirements from time to time in force. Some Masonic Halls have issued guidance requesting Brethren to wear masks, such a policy does not carry the force of law and is only advisory. It is up to individual members to decide whether they wish to attend a meeting masked or unmasked. After everything we have been through, it would be regrettable if face coverings became a point of contention. I am sure that a liberal application of common sense will determine our practices in the Lodge and at the festive board. I am confident that following the guidance issued by the government and the UGLE will see us through the next few weeks, at which point we anticipate a further relaxation in the guidance governing association, social distancing, mask wearing and the need to self isolate, especially if we have been double jabbed.

I was pleased to be able to join Derek Gibbens and thirty plus Lodge Charity Stewards at a Zoom meeting at which members of the Berkshire Masonic Charity made a presentation. This was followed by a superb presentation from Simon Leighfield which was followed by a challenging question and answer session. I was particularly pleased to note the zeal and passion demonstrated by a number of contributors. It really is important that Lodge office holders are not simply 'placemen' but that they should be more than able to articulate their views on the subject for which they represent the Brethren of the Lodge.

I was also delighted to join the Communication Team for the seventh and final MEET THE OFFICER meeting when Steve Lee was the guest speaker. I feel sure everyone who has attended the series will agree with me that they have been very worthwhile. Sadly, due to illness the meeting on Wednesday 25<sup>th</sup> August at which Deputy Grand Secretary Graham Redman was to be the guest speaker has had to be postponed (see page 5).



#### New Covid Rules....

While many Covid-19 restrictions were lifted on Monday 19<sup>th</sup> July, I am sure it might prove useful to reiterate the UGLE's stance, which covers both the Craft and Royal Arch.

- 1. In holding Lodge and Chapter meetings it is essential that Brethren and Companions comply with all legal requirements from time to time in force.
- **2.** Provided that they do so, it is not UGLE's policy to impose restrictions on meeting beyond those required by the law.
- **3.** No pressure must be applied to anyone either to attend or refrain from attending meetings.
- **4.** The same principle applies to the wearing of face coverings, which should be regarded as a matter of personal choice.
- **5.** The use of the modifications to the ceremonies, introduced in the summer of 2020 to enable ceremonies to be performed, should cease as soon as is practicable, except where local legal requirements are imposed in relation to such matters as social distancing.
- **6.** The ceremony of Raising (and of Exaltation in the Royal Arch) is once again permitted.
- 7. It is nonetheless sensible to ensure that a candidate for any degree, and in particular that of initiation, is made aware that the ceremony he will undergo will involve a measure of physical contact, so that he can make his own decision as to whether to proceed with it at this time.



#### **VACCINE PASSPORTS**

No longer legally required - but will be up to individual venues



#### RULE OF SIX

Scrapped - no legal limits on social contact



#### WEDDINGS/FUNERALS

No limit on numbers



#### NIGHTCLUBS

No restrictions – can reopen for first time since pandemic began



#### SPORTS EVENTS

No restriction on numbers meaning stadiums can be full



#### **FACE MASKS**

No longer mandatory - but companies can make them compulsory



#### PUBS

No need to scan QR code on entry and can order at the bar



#### ONE-METRE RULE

Scrapped in law – meaning restaurants won't have to space tables



#### **WORKING FROM HOME**

WFH message will end - but employers can continue if they choose



#### **CARE HOMES**

Cap on only five visitors will be scrapped

### St Patrick's Lodge No.295 (Irish Constitution)....

The Brethren of St Pat's held their first Stated Communication since Covid-19 at Warminster Masonic Hall on Saturday 31<sup>st</sup> July. The Lodge, which featured in the Summer edition of Across the Plain is associated with the Royal Dragoon Guards which carries the history of four regiments: the 4th Royal Irish Dragoon Guards, the 5th Dragoon Guards, the 7th Dragoon Guards, and the 6th Inniskilling Dragoons. All four were raised between 1685 and 1689, when James II and William of Orange fought for the English throne.






