- **1. We must embrace change.** It has been said that "change is the law of life" Freemasonry competes in a fast changing social arena from which it seeks to attract potential members. It is therefore imperative that we create a pleasant environment in which our members can enjoy their Freemasonry.
- **2.** We need to build structures. Having spent a lifetime in business I recognise the need to build structures which support the provision of member services.
- **3. We must be relevant.** Our objective is to make Freemasonry relevant, acceptable and accessible and to ensure the wellbeing and enjoyment of our membership. The Province will be very pro-active, showcasing Wiltshire Freemasonry and building on the spirit of openness and transparency.
- **4. We must value the family.** Family is as important in Freemasonry as it is in well organised society. It forms and underpins our the society and that of which we are a part.
- **5. We must prize what we have.** Freemasonry possesses many great traditions which have served us so well over many years. Heritage is to be prized not scorned, as it is the seemingly archaic aspect of our fraternity which is the fulcrum on which the Freemason depends for support. I am persuaded of the need to be open and transparent but not at the expense of the unique and distinctive characteristics of Freemasonry.
- **6. We must Communicate.** In a world where the smartphone, tablet and laptop rule, Freemasons must adapt to the popular means of communication. Social media sites, despite the inherent problems they have experienced are still the preferred method of exchanging information amongst a large group within society Freemasons included.

Seven years on I am proud to say that the six points are still the surest guide to success for Wiltshire Freemasonry. As we enter 2022 I trust we will have but one aim in view; to unite in the grand design of being happy and to communicate happiness.



It's a very different job....

You would have imagined that having been the Provincial Grand Secretary for four years I might have had a clear insight into the role and duties of the Assistant Provincial Grand Master; you would have been wrong. Sometimes it is possible to be so wrapped up in your own job that you simply do not have time to take a close interest in the tasks performed by your colleagues. Working at close range with the Provincial Grand Master, his Deputy, and the Assistant you do get a sense of their work, and to appreciate the level of commitment to Freemasonry which is unseen by many in the Province. But you can't really claim to know what it is they actually do beyond dealing with an ever increasing pile of paperwork, attending business and Lodge meetings, presenting certificates etc.

I suppose the easiest way to describe the difference between being the Provincial Secretary and the Assistant Provincial Grand Master is by thinking of the former role being about process and administration, while the latter is much focused on being out and about and ceremonial. It is also the case that your mindset has to change from being a backroom person to being a visible face of the Province.

It's also very special to be involved in the management of the Province in quite a different way to that of my previous role of Secretary. Wiltshire is very fortunate in that the Provincial Grand Master operates in a very collegiate manner, seeking opinions from various sources and taking advice from his executive team. As an advisor your only expectation is that something you say might influence a decision, whereas being a member of the executive allows you to become a decision maker with the huge responsibility that goes with the job.

After two months I can honestly say that I am privileged and honoured to occupy the office of Assistant Provincial Grand Master and I am looking forward to visiting Lodges across the Province, meeting Brethren and enjoying the camaraderie that is so unique to Freemasonry.
