We can look forward with hope....

It may well be a short month but under no circumstances can February be called a quiet month. In fact when I look at my diary, and that of the Province, I am simply amazed at how busy the month will be.

For many of our Lodges the month ahead is a smorgasbord of activities ranging from Initiations, Passings and Raising, interspersed with presentations of 50 and 60 year service certificates, Grand Lodge certificates, lectures and discussion groups.

I am really delighted at the way Lodges have responded to the recent changes in the rules regarding the pandemic. As we enter February I feel sure we are all relieved to know that the Omicron variant of Covid -19 has proven to be less aggressive than first feared. As the science supports a relaxation of the Covid restrictions, the Government has stated that we no longer need to wear a face covering unless it is in a health or care setting, but they do ask that we consider wearing one in crowded, enclosed spaces where we may come into contact with people we do not normally meet.

The vaccination programme is ongoing and I thank those Brethren are assisting with marshalling at their local vaccination centre. I heard from the Communication Officer that Brethren from St Aldhelm Lodge No.2888 were out in force directing traffic and providing guidance to members of the public attending the hub. A huge well done Brethren.

I have already mentioned activity levels in our Lodges and consider it worth reinforcing the message that the Province has over 100 men waiting to be Initiated into Freemasonry, and that new enquiries are being received every week. I understand that a very few Lodges are reluctant to accept Internet candidates preferring to welcome only those men introduced by their own members. While I cannot pretend to understand such a stance, as in many cases a candidate introduced by a member will be no better known to the majority of members than an Internet candidate; I have asked the the membership team to respect the wishes of Lodges which do not want to be offered Internet enquiries.

In 2016 I wrote a short piece about non-Masonic conduct in Lodges. Events during the past few months have led me to conclude that it is necessary to repeat some of the points made previously. I feel sure you will all agree that the future of Wiltshire Freemasonry is at the heart of everything we do, and yet occasions still occur when the harmony of the Lodge is disturbed by incidents which simply do not accord with Masonic behaviour.

As Freemasons we are exhorted to "amicably settle our differences" and to work with that love and harmony which should characterise Freemasons. I am very aware that some issues are more difficult to reconcile, and in such cases it were better that the Brethren retire from the Lodge than allow their presence to disturb its harmony. As and when an 'issue' occurs the Province will investigate the matter and where necessary administer the appropriate action. Of course it would be far better for Brethren to dwell together in unity, a situation much more in keeping with the purest principles of our Order.

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Are we a good advertisement for Freemasonry....

It has been said that the purpose of Freemasonry is the pursuit of excellence. All of the teachings of Freemasonry are directed to excellence in performing our duties to God, our country, our neighbours and ourselves. The continuing effort to improve oneself is the true mark of a Freemason. This principle should cause us to remember that in every moment of our life, whether it be in public, at work and even at home, we are Freemasons.

Those who are not Freemasons, but who know we are, will judge each of us and Freemasonry itself, by the way in which we conduct ourselves. We have in trust the reputation of Freemasonry, and every newly Installed Master is asked to "Forcibly impress on the Brethren of your Lodge the dignity and importance of Freemasonry, seriously admonish them never to disgrace it..." The reason for this exhortation is quite simple and straightforward, it is that a Freemason can "prove to the world the happy and beneficial effects of our ancient and honourable Institution." But before we can expect to attract good men to the fraternity by our conduct and reputation in public, we must learn to conduct ourselves with propriety in the Lodge. But what is 'propriety?

The definition of propriety is 'conformity to conventionally accepted standards of behaviour or morals' - from which we can safely say that the practice of propriety is not simply about following the law or an adherence to the Book of Constitutions and the Lodge By-Laws, it is much more about observing **sensible** tradition, custom and usage, and like good manners, it has behind it only the force of opinion. Change is the law of life, and progress must of necessity occur. It is no accident that a new member of the Order is told that he is required to - "ever afterwards act and abide by the ancient usages and established customs of the Order."

While the principles and ideals of Freemasonry are universal, social customs and Masonic traditions can differ. But wherever you may be, you can be sure that respect and honesty toward your fellow Freemason, as taught by the square and compasses, will be the fundamental guide for your conduct. Indeed, no institution can boast a more solid foundation than that on which Freemasonry rests, the practice of every moral and social virtue.

The Provincial Grand Master mentions non-Masonic conduct. I don't believe this needs to be defined, nor should we or could we provide a list of Masonic do's and don'ts. Such an attempt would fail for at least two reasons, first, no one would read it, and second, as Freemasons, each of us is expected to apply the tools and principles of the Craft to our own lives. It is justly said that the only advertisement a Freemason needs is to be found in his conduct.

The one word which I believe should be hard wired into our brain is RESPECT which is both the least honour that we require and the highest honour that we can hope for in our dealings with our fellow men. Respect encompasses our words, our actions, our appearance and even our thoughts. Inside the Lodge and outside of it, we should strive to demonstrate in every way our respect for a Brother's honour, feelings, efforts, hopes and any other part of his life that we may contact.

Members of Radnor Lodge No.4451 welcomed their very own Guide Dog into the Lodge. Aptly named Radnor, he was joined by some friends and took centre stage much to everyone's delight. It was a year ago that Radnor started his training programme and what super progress he has made. Seriously, and all joking aside, well done Radnor Lodge for em**barking** on such a fantastic initiative. We look forward to receiving regular updates on Radnor's progress during the year.
