Summer is here....

It's so difficult to believe that half the year has gone and we are now in July the seventh month of the year. The June solstice which occurred on Tuesday 21st June marks the official beginning of summer in the Northern Hemisphere, when Earth arrives at the point in its orbit and where the North Pole is at its maximum tilt (about 23.5 degrees) toward the Sun, resulting in the longest day and shortest night of the calendar year. By longest day, we mean the longest period of sunlight hours. However, the longest day reminds us that it's all downhill after that with each day of sunlight reducing in time. It's little wonder

that we try to take advantage of the daylight hours to enjoy outdoor activities.

The writer Richard Jefferies was born at Coate in the north Wiltshire countryside - now on the outskirts of Swindon. Jefferies is best known for his prolific and sensitive writing on natural history, rural life and agriculture in late Victorian England. To some people he is more familiar as the author of the children's classic 'Bevis' or the strange futuristic fantasy 'After London'. Since his death his books have enjoyed intermittent spells of popularity, but today he is unknown to the greater part of the reading public. There is a Richard Jefferies museum in Swindon which I am told is well worth a visit. I particularly like Jefferies quote in the header of this month's newsletter which is taken from 'The Pageant of Summer'.

For many Lodge members the months of July and August are 'meeting free' and allow for a period of rest and recuperation. For members of the Province's management team there really is no such thing as downtime. 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
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We're thinking Festival....



Charitable giving is not just about giving money, it can also be the giving of goods or personal time. Equally, charity is not just about giving to organisations established for a particular purpose, it is perfectly right and proper for Freemasons to practice charity toward its own members. The often quoted 'Charity Charge' given to the new Freemason is explicit in reminding us that it is on behalf of a member reduced to the lowest ebb of poverty and distress that the claim on a Brother's charity is first made.

The Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF) is funded through the generosity of Freemasons, their families, and their friends. The MCF is one of the largest grant-making charities in the country and aims to be a force for good by providing support, care and services to Freemasons and their families in need, and supporting other charities to help the most disadvantaged in society.

Working with the Provincial Almoner, the MCF Masonic support team helps Freemasons and their families gain access to the wide range of financial, health, family and care support available from the Foundation.

The Provincial Charity Steward liaises with the charity grants team as it works directly with other charities who are applying for funding. The team processes applications, offers advice to prospective applicants and awards grants. The picture on Page 3 graphically displays the support Wiltshire receives from the MCF.

The work of the MCF is subject to the funds at their disposal. The MCF fundraising team helps to coordinate and encourage the fundraising efforts of Provinces, Lodges, and individual Freemasons.

Over the next few months I will be telling you more about the Wiltshire 2028 Festival and the important part, you and your Lodge, and especially your Lodge Charity Steward will be asked to play.

What I can tell you is that Wiltshire is being asked to support the Masonic Charitable Foundation which as you will know is the Freemasons' charity. I can also confirm to you that there is a superb new Festival jewel (approved by the UGLE and the MCF) which I am sure we will all be proud to wear in support of the Masonic Charitable Foundation.

Details of the launch, targets (yes, I know you will all have expected that there would be targets), events and other plans will be communicated to you between now and the end of the year.

What I can promise you is that the Wiltshire 2028 Festival will be a challenge but it will also be fun.

The annual meeting of Provincial Grand Lodge is an event at which the attendance of all active Provincial Officers is expected, and I am sure every officer of the current year, together with those appointed to serve for 2022/23 will join the Deputy Provincial Grand Master and myself for the event.
