They moved to Wiltshire in 1983.

John was Initiated into the Border Lodge No 3129 in November 1988. He is also a member of Wiltshire Masters' Lodge No 6731.

He was appointed a Provincial Grand Steward in October 2000 and the following year promoted to Past Provincial Senior Grand Deacon and in 2007 to Past Provincial Senior Grand Warden.

In April 2022 the MW Grand Master HRH the Duke of Kent honoured John with the appointment of Grand Sword Bearer; an active rank that he is very proud to hold.

The summons for the Annual Meeting of Provincial Grand Lodge has now been sent to all Lodge secretaries, and can also be read in the Summer edition of Across the Plain.

The annual meeting of Provincial Grand Lodge is the jewel in the crown in terms of an event at which the attendance of all active Provincial Officers is expected, and I am sure every officer of the current year, together with those appointed to serve for 2022/23 will join the Assistant Provincial Grand Master and myself at the meeting.

Michael Barratt shares his view of the stars....



The quote in the header of this edition of **In touch > On line** is a reference to the Perseid Meteor Shower which is the richest "shooting star" shower of the year with a ZHR (overhead hourly rate) of +80 meteors. Who better than the Province's resident astronomer Michael Barratt to explain the Perseid Meteor Shower.

In good years this can be quite spectacular and has often been called "a celestial fireworks show".

The Perseids are already with us (until 24th August) and you may see the odd one on any clear night at the moment with the maximum being reached on the 13th. Unfortunately this year the maximum coincides with a full moon and therefore many will be "washed out" by strong moonlight. If you spot one they often leave persistent trails for a few seconds.

Incidentally, the month of August is a great time to view the Milky Way and the wonderful constellations through which it runs; Cygnus, Aquila, Scutum, Scorpius and Sagittarius.

A quick reminder from Michael to never ever look at the sun directly, especially through binoculars or a telescope. Happy star gazing.
