Thinking - why should I support the Festival?

As a member of the Festival Committee, I am always interested to hear from the readers of **In touch>On line** on how they are gearing up to support the Masonic Charitable Foundation over the course of the Wiltshire 2028 Festival. Indeed, some of the Province's members are asking for even more information about what they can do to make the Wiltshire 2028 Festival a great success.

In August I was told of how a grant from the Masonic Charitable Foundation has had an amazing impact on the lives of young people in the county. Youth Action Wiltshire & Outdoor Education is a charity based in Devizes that provided mental health support to young people affected by Covid-19. In two published case studies the team was able to offer support to John* who cared for a person with a life-limiting condition, and also to Susan* a young person who had been bullied at school over a long period and which had a massive negative impact on their confidence and self esteem. The charity received £22,000 that enabled them to allocate specialist counsellors to help John and Susan make informed decisions, helping them to manage and process what is happening in their lives. *The real names of both young people have been substituted.

The second piece of good news was the award of a grant of £60,000 over 3 years to the Youth Adventure Trust based in Swindon and whose aim is defined as 'Creating the Best Start in Life for Disadvantaged Children and Young People'.

The Youth Adventure Trust is a well-established local charity working to support vulnerable young people aged 11 – 15 years in Wiltshire who have complex needs and are living in deprived communities. These young people have been severely impacted by the COVID-19 lockdowns as their home life often created a 'toxic' environment. The charity reports that the instances of self-harm and those suffering from an eating disorder as a result has trebled.

Most of the beneficiaries they support have suffered from Adverse Childhood Experiences in their lives. The charity works with schools in the most deprived areas of Swindon and Wiltshire to identify beneficiaries to be referred.

The Youth Adventure Programme aims to equip these beneficiaries with greater resilience to enable them to overcome their challenges and reach their full potential. The charity provides a sustained, long-term programme over three years, consisting of three intensive residential camps with structured activities outdoors including sailing, rock climbing, bushcraft skills and canoeing. All activities are designed to help the beneficiaries to reach personal goals and build self-esteem and confidence. Sessions are delivered by qualified Youth Support Workers and specially trained volunteers. Towards the end of the programme the beneficiaries attend four Pathway Days, in which they reflect on their learning and are linked with other youth organisations to ensure they continue to receive support after they leave the programme. The programme is the charity's flagship programme and is ASDAN accredited, enabling the young people to gain credits towards qualifications from skills they have learnt over the three years.

The grant will fund 20 young people to participate in the full three-year programme. I'm sure you will agree these stories confirm why Freemasons should support the MCF.

Seal of Solomon.....

The latest version of Middle Chamber Gin has been called the Seal of Solomon, but what is or was the Seal of Solomon, and does it have connection to Freemasonry?

The Seal of Solomon also known as the Ring of Solomon is believed to have been a magical seal owned by King Solomon of Israel. The symbol has its roots in Jewish beliefs but later gained importance among Islamic and Western occult groups, as both of these adopted it from Jewish tradition.

The name 'Solomon's seal' was given to the hexagram engraved on the bottom of drinking-cups in Arab tradition.

As a symbol, the Seal of Solomon is still in use today and one of its simplest depictions is either as a pentagram or as a hexagram, the latter being similar to the Star of David.

The legend of the Seal of Solomon was developed primarily by medieval Middle Eastern writers, who related that the ring was engraved by God and was given to the king directly from heaven. The ring was made from brass and iron, and the two parts were used to seal written commands to good and evil spirits, respectively. In one tale, a demon, either Asmodeus or Sakhr, gained possession of the ring and ruled in King Solomon's stead for forty days. In a variant of the tale of the ring of Polycrates from Herodotus, the demon eventually threw the ring into the sea, where it was swallowed by a fish, caught by a fisherman, and served to Solomon.

In different traditions, the hexagram can be seen as the combination of the four elements. Fire is symbolized as an upwards pointing triangle, while Air (its elemental opposite) is also an upwards pointing triangle, but with a horizontal line through its centre. Water is symbolized as a downwards pointing triangle, while Earth (its elemental opposite) is a downwards pointing triangle with a horizontal line through its centre. In a hexagram, therefore, it was assumed that the symbols of all four elements could be seen combined.

The hexagram is featured within and on the outside of many Masonic Lodge Rooms as a decoration.

"The interlacing triangles or deltas symbolise the union of the two principles or forces, the active and passive, male and female, pervading the universe ... The two triangles, one white and the other black, interlacing, typify the mingling of apparent opposites in nature, darkness and light, error and truth, ignorance and wisdom, evil and good, throughout human life." — Albert G. Mackey: Encyclopedia of Freemasonry.

Hermes - it's the future



Hermes is the winged herald and messenger of the Olympian gods (the Romans called him Mercury)

For modern day 21st century Freemasons, particularly the Lodge secretary and the Chapter Scribe E, Hermes is the name given to a project which will transform the way in which they work. It's about moving away from endless form-filling, and providing a web based system enabling administrators to process data in real time.

A Craft and Royal Arch Steering Group has been working towards the release of Hermes. The project has been in design and development for almost three years, and the feedback from those Secretaries and Scribes E who have so far used the system has been very positive. The package is well designed, easy to use, and will significantly reduce paperwork, making the life of the Secretary or Scribe E very much easier.

Craft Secretaries and Royal Arch Scribes E. will receive training on the new system. The training will be delivered by carefully selected volunteers from across the Province, who will ensure that the transition goes as smoothly as possible and that support is just a phone call away, should it be needed. Training sessions will be delivered throughout October and there will be plenty of opportunity to practice the new skills before we go live.

Outgoing Provincial Grand Master Philip Bullock said "Hermes presents us with the opportunity to help Lodge and Chapter administrators eliminate unnecessary paperwork and processes by taking advantage of the latest technology has to offer Freemasonry and our membership. I am sure all of us are looking forward to the real benefits it will bring in streamlining the way in which we assemble and manage essential data".
