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The Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies.....

In this edition of **In touch>On line** I want to reiterate the Provincial view on a subject which continues to cause confusion in some of our Lodges at the Installation meeting.

Three addresses to three different groups of people; seems so simple doesn't it, and yet if there is one subject which creates a sense of them and us, it's the big question of the day – do I stand or do I remain in my seat.

When does this dilemma occur? Yes, you've guessed it; it's that moment when the Provincial Director of Ceremonies escorts the Provincial Junior Warden onto the floor of the Lodge and intones "Would the Brethren of (name of Lodge) with the exception of the Worshipful Master and the recently installed Wardens please stand".

The seeming dilemma is - who should stand? Which begs the question 'who are the Brethren to whom the address is being made? I suggest the answer is perfectly logical based on the fact there are only three addresses, the first to the Worshipful Master, the second to the two newly appointed and invested Wardens and the third to those who remain – the Brethren. Thus all becomes crystal clear. If you are not the Master or either of the Wardens you stand.

However, it seems that for some Brethren the thought remains that the address titled To The Brethren is only for those who have not yet been Wardens in the Lodge. Interestingly, the same logic is not applied to a Master or a Warden taking the office for a second time, or for a Brother moving from being Junior to Senior Warden.

In the address we are told that some must of necessity rule and teach (that would be the Master and his two Wardens) while others must of course learn, submit and obey (that's the rest of the Lodge), and humility in each is an essential qualification.

In the second degree we are reminded that 'Although distinctions among men are necessary to preserve subordination, let no eminence of situation cause us to forget we are Brothers equally entitled to the same regard'.

I am so glad that in Wiltshire almost all of our Lodges have adopted the practice of every Brother standing to receive the words delivered by the Provincial Junior Grand Warden. If your Lodge is resisting the invitation to join, please can I say that Past Provincial Grand Masters, Right Worshipful and Very Worshipful Brethren, and Grand Officers have not thought it beneath their dignity to stand to hear the wonderful words of the Address to the Brethren.

So next time the Provincial Junior Warden steps forward, don't feel abashed to jump to your feet and stand with your Brothers in the Lodge when the Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies asks "Would the Brethren of (name of Lodge) with the exception of the Worshipful Master and the recently installed Wardens, please stand".



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Past Provincial Grand Master remembers.....

Swindon Heritage recently unveiled its 12th Blue Plaque to celebrate the life of one of its most famous sons; and Right Worshipful Brother Byron Carron was invited to do the honours at the Bath Road residence where his father, renowned operatic tenor Arthur Carron, grew up.

Byron's father sang in the choir at the Central Methodist Church, where a clergyman heard him sing and suggested he take professional lessons in the capital. He made his operatic debut at the Old Vic as Tannhäuser in 1929.

Arthur Carron was a founding member of SALOS (Swindon Light Operatic Society) and used to host meetings and auditions at the house.

In 1931, he became the Old Vic company's leading tenor when it moved to Sadler's Wells Theatre. His roles there included Fra Diavolo, Manrico of Il Trovatore, Radames of Aida, Cavaradossi of Tosca, and Otello.

Arthur's mentor and teacher was so impressed with his musicality that she suggested he audition for the Metropolitan Opera in New York City; and in 1935 he made his debut there as the first Englishman to sing at the Met, playing Canio in Pagliacci and taking 15 curtain calls during one performance. Arthur remained with the opera house until 1946.

His biggest concert in Chicago attracted an audience of 10,000 people. Before he retired in 1952, Arthur spent the last six years of his career at Covent Garden. He died in 1967.

Byron said, "My father sang at Alexandra Palace during the beginning of the BBC and his voice was so strong it broke some of the microphones, he didn't need one". Byron added that his father "Was a seventh child of a seventh child, which is something special".
