In the Book of Constitutions there is a section titled The Charges of a Free-Mason; there are six in total and number three references 'Of LODGES'. It defines what a Lodge is - it's a place where Freemasons meet, and it's also the collective name for a group of Freemasons. It's important to remind ourselves that Freemasons meet in and as a Lodge for a purpose, which is to instruct and improve themselves. In 2023, wouldn't it be wonderful for Brethren throughout the Province to attend as many, if not all the meetings of their Lodge in order that a knowledge of the established usages and customs of the craft can be acquired.

If you are serious about making real changes in your everyday life you need to take certain steps. It is great to dream big; however, to make your dreams come true you need to do something about them, not just daydream. The same is true of Freemasonry. To make a daily advancement in Masonic knowledge, and to obtain the privileges of Freemasonry with the aim of making yourself more extensively serviceable requires the same determination and perseverance as you need to bring to fruition your New Year resolutions. I am confident that 2023 will prove to be the year of positive change.
