

What a fabulous night.



I was really pleased to be able to host the launch of our Wiltshire 2028 Festival in support of the Masonic Charitable Foundation. I must admit that I wasn't quite sure what to expect, but what I can say is that any expectations I might have had were exceeded and more. The Province welcomed Sir Paul Williams and his wife Glenys to Wiltshire, together with Les Hutchinson, the Chief Executive of the Masonic Charitable Foundation. Les gave a very concise account of the work of the MCF and explained how Wiltshire was a net beneficiary of funding from the Charity having received over £1,300,000 in grants to individuals (invariably a Freemason or a dependant), and to local charities such as the three major hospices in the county, the Wiltshire Air Ambulance and the Youth

Adventure Trust. I was very much aware of the MCF's generosity when I sat with the Provincial Executive to discuss what our goal should be for the Festival and, by default, the amount we would be asking our Lodges to raise. Before I move away from the launch dinner, thank you to everyone who has taken the time to let me know how much they enjoyed the evening, and yes (to a question I was asked) - it is the intention to hold a dinner dance in each of the five years of festival.

As you would expect I want to achieve a good result, but how much we will raise as a Province is tempered with the reality that the cost of living has had an effect on everyone's finances and by default the amount of money we have available to spend. However, I know that Wiltshire Freemasons need little motivation to practice that virtue we recognise as being the distinguishing characteristic of a Freemason's heart. I have absolutely no doubt that Freemasons across the Province will discover ways to support the Wiltshire 2028 Festival and The Masonic Charitable Foundation.

I mentioned last month that the festival team has prepared a short presentation that they hope every Lodge will invite them to present. Thank you to the Lodges that have already invited the team to present and answer any questions the Brethren may have.

With regard to the festival, I was very proud to wear my Wiltshire 2028 Festival Jewel at the meeting of Thynne Chapter No.1478, and, while I can't claim to be the first Brother to wear the new jewel, I was very proud to be one of four Companions to wear it at a Chapter meeting (See pic page 5).

The link connecting the Craft and the Royal Arch is indissoluble, that is, it is lasting and can never be destroyed. In my capacity as Provincial Grand Master and Grand Superintendent, I have the honour of leading both the Craft and the Royal Arch and it is my earnest hope that the relationship between the two will become even stronger. I have therefore announced that the Wiltshire 2028 Festival Jewel is to be worn by Brethren in their Lodge and by Companions in their Chapter.

This time of the Masonic year is normally when Brethren are notified of a first Provincial appointment or promotion in the Craft . You will be reassured to know that letters offering an appointment or promotion will be sent out during the coming week. An appointment or promotion is not an entitlement based on length of service, although service to the Lodge after having passed the Chair is one of a number of criteria considered. The award of Provincial rank is not only a reward for past service it is also to be regarded as an opportunity and incentive for further service to the Lodge, to the Province and to Freemasonry in general.

Today I want to say thank you to each and every one who contributes to the well running of their Lodge. Your efforts are very much appreciated.

Who wears the collar?

A Brother who has served for a full year as a Master of a Lodge and has vacated the Chair on the installation of his successor is not only entitled to, but must, wear the collar and jewel of a Past Master at all Craft meetings until he is able to exchange it for one of a higher rank. It therefore follows that a Provincial officer does not wear the collar and jewel of a Past Master.

But what of the Brother who is asked to stand in for an absent Officer? Should he wear the collar and jewel of the absent Officer? The answer is 'yes he should' even if the Brother is a visitor, but if the Officer is present, the stand-in must not take over his collar, but be dressed according to his own rank.

An extra thought on thumb up or thumb down.

In the February edition of **In touch>On line** the question was raised as to which was the correct way of acknowledging the words fidelity, fidelity, fidelity said by the IPM at the close of the meeting. Thank you for the very constructive comments made by many readers. In this edition the subject is of a similar nature and concerns the position of the thumb (what a challenge this little digit presents to the Freemason!) during an obligation when taken in the second degree. Without disclosing too much of the ceremony it should surely be recognised and readily acknowledge that the only guidance one needs to determine the correct sign is to read the words of rubric set out in the Emulation Ritual and printed in red; and which clearly state Sp and Sn of F. There we have it, a Sn of F - definitely not a Sn of R. Thus we should be in no doubt that an obligation in the second degree is always the Sn of F which means 'thumb up'.

The distinguishing characteristic of a Freemason's heart is of course charity. Every Freemason will know and be able to recite the words which follow this phrase found in the charge given to the new Initiate as he stands for the first time in the northeast corner of the building. It is often referred to as The Charity Charge and explains why in some Lodges it is given to the newly made brother by the Lodge Charity Steward.

The Provincial Grand Master John Reid formally launched the Wiltshire 2028 Festival on Saturday 18th February and it is already receiving support from Lodges, individual Brethren and even from outside of the Province.

The new Wiltshire 2028 Festival Jewel has been well received and twelve Lodges have already placed orders and received a jewel allocation. If you have taken the steps that qualify you for a Festival Jewel please contact your Lodge Charity Steward.

The Provincial Grand Master has announced that the jewel can also be worn in your Royal Arch Chapter (p.s. John wore his at Thynne Chapter No.1478).
