The wearing of Masonic jewels.

One of the most frequent questions asked of me is "What is the proper order to wear Masonic jewels?" It does seem that despite numerous articles in Across the Plain, In touch>On line and on social media there is still some confusion as to what is right and what is wrong. The Provincial Grand Master has asked me to repeat the previous guidance.

Lodge By-Laws are silent on the wearing of Masonic jewels, and rightly so as a Lodge does not have any authority to create a jewel or determine the wearing of a jewel without the express permission of the Grand Master (delegated to the PrGM).

While By-Laws, and the Constitutions are classed as rules; just as important are the customs that control behaviour in social groups or social situations. This is often referred to as 'etiquette' and for many doing what is 'right and proper' over and above what falls within the strict rule of law is a mark of common decency". Wiltshire Freemasons are encouraged to follow Provincial guidelines in respect of etiquette.

If qualified to do so you should wear the Royal Arch jewel and it is always worn as the first jewel on the left breast nearest the heart.

Again, subject to qualification, the next jewel is the UGLE Tercentenary jewel, followed by the Provincial Festival jewel (when in Festival and until it has been designated a permanent jewel) and then by any Lodge jewel (which in Wiltshire should only be worn in the Lodge to which they refer). Incidentally, it is quite strange to see Brethren still wearing the 2005 and 2017 Festival Jewels. Far better to be wearing the Wiltshire 2028 Festival Jewel.

Provincial Officers (of this Province) and Grand Officers do not tend to wear Founders, Past Masters and other Lodge specific jewels.

It might come as a surprise to many former and serving members of the armed forces to discover that the wearing of military medals is not advocated by the Book of Constitutions. Indeed Rule 239 BoC is explicit in determining that *The regalia, clothing, insignia, and jewels to be worn are as hereinafter prescribed, and no Brother shall be admitted into any meeting of Grand Lodge, or of any subordinate Lodge, without the clothing appropriate to his rank under the Grand Lodge.*

N.B. Masonic etiquette dictates that it is inappropriate to wear civil or military decorations and medals with Masonic regalia. When we enter the Lodge Room we leave our distinctions of ordinary life behind us and are all Brethren. (Graham Redman - Masonic Etiquette Today)

Order of wear

To avoid any misunderstanding the diagram shows the order in which Masonic Jewels are to be worn in Wiltshire (subject to qualification).

- 1. The Royal Arch Jewel
- 2. The UGLE Tercentenary Jewel
- 3. The Provincial Festival 2028 Jewel
- 4. A Lodge Past Master's Jewel (only in the Lodge to which it refers)
- 5. A Lodge Centenary Jewel (only in the Lodge to which it refers)



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Festival Jewels - have you got yours?

The Wiltshire 2028 Festival Jewel has clearly captured the attention of many members of the Province, so much so that the Provincial Grand Master has commented on the number of Brethren wearing a jewel. It really is a nice jewel and if you are unaware of the qualifying process for a Festival Jewel your Charity Steward is the 'go to person' as the face of the Festival in the Lodge.

• A Brother or Companion qualifies for a Festival Jewel when they have given either £600 to the Festival or signed up for a Regular Payment Plan (RPP) that will reach £600 by December 2028 (or a combination of the two).
