The congregational singing was magnificent with contributions from members of The Wessex, an award winning male voice choir; and ladies from the Thamesdown Ladies Choir. In the programme or Order of Service, whichever you prefer, the penultimate page contained a small advertisement for Teddies For Loving Care (Wiltshire) I was delighted to be informed that donations received in support of this wonderful initiative totalled £1,600 to which there will be some gift aid applied. In 2023 the TLC team distributed 3,600 bears to Swindon, and Salisbury hospitals, this was an increase of 800 on the previous year and reflected the increase in children attending A&E Departments.

Charity is said to be the distinguishing characteristic of a Freemason's heart; in Wiltshire we believe that charity is in a freemason's DNA. Some might ask what is the difference? My response would be that one is affected by how we feel therefore it is governed by emotion whereas the other is more fundamental and unchangeable. I have certainly experienced the best and worst of when charity is governed by feelings, or a sense of wanting to do the right thing. The problem with allowing emotions to dictate matters is that it is possible to lose sight of the big issue and adopt a myopic approach to resolving a situation, at the same time having little, if any regard for the alternate view. Just because someone doesn't necessarily take or share the same view doesn't mean they are less caring, and that they don't understand or appreciate the problem. In my experience there are often many different ways to achieve the same end result, and it is always best to get that result 'the right way'.

As we start a new year I want to remind everyone that we are in festival - sadly some of our members incline to view that the festival has nothing to do with them. Today I want to make clear that it does. As Wiltshire Freemasons we acknowledge and support the work of the Masonic Charitable Foundation; we might not agree with every cause they support (believe me when I say that strong views are represented to the management of the MCF whenever we find ourselves at odds with their decisions) but we do have a moral obligation to support them.

By the end of the **Wiltshire 2028 Festival** we hope the level of our support will be one million pounds. Circumstances may result in that figure being a little lower than we would anticipate, equally, and who knows, it may be more. Time alone will tell. The Deputy Provincial Grand Master will continue to charge the festival team to encourage your active participation, as will the Provincial Charity Steward and your Lodge Charity Steward.

The easiest way to help is for every subscribing member of the Lodge to set up a Regular Payment Plan (RPP). If you haven't done so already, I earnestly implore you to do so as soon as possible. I know you will have heard this before but it is worth repeating. To reach £600 per member over five years is £120 per year; or £10 per month; £2.50 per week; or 35 pence per day. To put this into perspective a national tabloid newspaper costs £1 per day. On page 3 Stonehenge Lodge No.6114 made a significant contribution towards their goal when they donated £10,000 to the festival.

Having mentioned the **Wiltshire 2028 Festival** let me also say that I continue to be amazed, and delighted at the level of giving by individual Lodges to local charities. When I visit Lodges I really am moved when I hear a Charity Steward reporting the members have given money to a small charity for whom £250 is so very important. Brethren, this Province will never direct you to stop doing this - it is your money and it is for your members to decide who should benefit from your charity.

Finally, I take this opportunity to wish the entire Wiltshire Masonic family a very happy, healthy and prosperous New Year. May 2024 be everything you wish it to be.

#### Annual Subscriptions are now due....

A new year brings with it the inevitable reminder from the Lodge Treasurer that Lodge annual subscriptions are due. Most Lodge and Chapter by-laws state that a subscription is payable IN FULL: IN ADVANCE, by a single specified date. What does this mean in practice? In a case where a Lodge or Chapter does not insist on observing this requirement it is in violation of its own by-laws and is therefore behaving irregularly and the Brother or Companion is by default IN ARREARS.

A Brother who is paying his subscription by instalments during the current year IS IN ARREARS for the entire period until he has paid in full. (Rule 147). It is possible therefore that he could be in arrears for eleven out of the twelve months of every year. A Lodge/Chapter allowing this practice could also be making a nonsense of any provisions in their by-laws for exclusion on the grounds of arrears after a stated period of time.

Even in the case of a Lodge or Chapter where no such requirement is stated in their by-laws, the practice must be viewed as dangerous. It can render vulnerable the cash-flow of the Lodge or Chapter, as, should the number of Brethren delaying their subscription in this way reach a critical mass (and if it is permitted, presumably every member must have the opportunity of doing so), the Lodge or Chapter could be rendered unable to discharge its regular financial liabilities, unless it has sufficient reserves.

A Lodge or Chapter is always carrying a retrospective debt. Treasurers should be well aware that the most significant outgoings (dues to Grand Lodge/Chapter and to Province) are payable retrospectively. Thus sufficient funds have to be available at the appropriate time this year to pay last year's bills. Grand Lodge have made it clear in their model by-laws that they would not approve new or amended by-laws which omitted the requirement to pay subscriptions in full: in advance. One acceptable alternative is to pay a subscription by instalments during the previous year, so that it is paid in full by the due date.
