Society Without Abuse...



For over 50 years Wiltshire Freemasons have been passionate supporters in the provision of a facility for what were euphemistically referred to as 'battered wives' or victims of domestic abuse. The Swindon refuge under the inspired leadership of the late Jenni Manners captured the hearts, minds, and wallets of local Freemasons. The doors to the refuge opened in August 1975 becoming one of the first operational refuges outside of London. Since then, the charity has helped thousands of victims and survivors to start new lives which are free from violence and abuse.

In January 2025, reflecting the changing activities of the

organisation which now include work outside the immediate Swindon area, and with all who need support including women, men and children affected by abuse, the charity became Society Without Abuse (SWA).

Kate Rowland, CEO of SWA reminds us that "Domestic abuse continues to happen at an alarming rate across Swindon, Wiltshire and the whole of the UK. The reality is that official figures on abuse are likely to be an underestimation as many incidents of domestic abuse go under the radar. To change the future, we need to come together as a society to tackle the root cause of abuse, through education, early intervention and prevention. We're very grateful for the support of Wiltshire Freemasons, which means that we can double the work we do directly with children and young people to help them recover from the trauma of domestic abuse. Thanks to our programmes; the HOPE Programme for young people, and working with those who are responsible for these harmful behaviours through our Open2Change programme, as well as the vital support we receive from organisations like the Freemasons, we are working to change the future, today."
